# H. J. RES. 128.

IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. CHURCH introduced the following joint resolution; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary and ordered to be printed.

## JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

1       *Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives*  
2       *of the United States of America in Congress assembled*  
3       *(two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the*  
4       following amendment be proposed to the legislatures of the  
5       several States as an amendment to the Constitution of the  
6       United States, which, when ratified by three-fourths of said  
7       legislatures, shall be valid as part of the Constitution, namely:

### “ARTICLE I.

9       “SEC. 8, Division 11. To declare war in cases of in-  
10       vasion or threatened invasion of the United States, or any  
11       of its insular possessions, by a foreign power, or in cases of  
12       insurrection or revolution within the United States, or any of  
13       its insular possessions, and in other cases where the matter of  
14       declaring war has been first submitted to the citizens of the  
15       United States at a special election called for that purpose

Mr. HULL of Tennessee introduced the following joint resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Agriculture and ordered to be printed.

**JOINT RESOLUTION**

To enable the Department of Agriculture, through the Bureaus of Statistics and Animal Industry and any other bureau, to gather and distribute information relative to live-stock conditions.

- 1 *Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives*
- 2 *of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
- 3 That for the purpose of enabling the United States Depart-
- 4 ment of Agriculture, through its Bureaus of Statistics and
- 5 Animal Industry and any other bureau, to gather informa-
- 6 tion as to the number, ages, condition, location by States
- 7 and sections, and estimated value of the different classes of
- 8 marketable live stock, including cattle, hogs, and sheep, and
- 9 make monthly report and publication thereof; and also in
- 10 the same connection to assemble and make monthly report
- 11 and publication of such other information as would shed
- 12 light on the amount of meats in cold storage, the general
- 13 trade movements of live stock and meats, together with all
