Freedom of Expression Restrictions During the Pandemic

The U.S. Agency for Global Media used this report as training material for their staff and featured it in a broadcast by the Voice of America.

Implementation of Human Rights in Select Jurisdictions

was cited by the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development's newly established Civic Space Laboratory for work with member state delegations.

Response to the Pandemic in Brazil




